


Samantha Sands from the Denver Museum of Water and Science presented "Digging the Ice Age: Water and Snow Mastodon Project"

Lunch 'n Learn

OPEN SOURCE RESOURCES

The Open Water Foundation is leading the effort to collaboratively develop, enhance and maintain open source water resource software tools, to the benefit of government, universities, consultants, nonprofits and the public. This Lunch 'n Learn examined innovative means to use technology to solve complex water issues and empower users with software tools for data analysis and visualization.

REGIONAL MODEL LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION ORDINANCE

This presentation covered the steps that the South Metro Water Supply Authority took as they created this ordinance. They demonstrated the key requirements and benefits to participating municipalities as well as tips and tools for implementation.

REGIONAL WATER EFFICIENCY & CONSERVATION PLANNING

Over the past few years, regional water efficiency and conservation planning has emerged as a trend in Colorado and other states. Since 2014, Peter Mayer has worked with communities in Colorado's Roaring Fork Valley, the Northern Colorado Water Conservancy District, and the New York City Department of Environmental Protection to develop three distinct regional water efficiency programs. This presentation described these regional planning efforts, what made them similar and distinct. Peter discussed the process of bringing participants to the table and finding ways to engage with water providers that have never before implemented water efficiency.

Webinar Series

WATER LOSS

This webinar explored best practices in water loss management including resources such as AWWA M36 Water Loss Control Methodology and free AWWA water audit software. Speakers discussed initiatives and programs being led buy the Colorado Water Conservation Board in 2018. The presentation included water loss programs and lessons learned from Aspen, Fort Collins and Montrose.

COOLING TOWERS

Whether looking to improve water efficiency in the CII sector, seeking opportunities to increase non-potable water use, or dealing with water quality impacts, cooling towers keep coming up in the conversation! This webinar provided an introduction to cooling towers for water managers.

These free events provide information sharing and networking opportunities for members and non-members throughout the year.





Live Like You Love It Communication Toolkit

Also known as LLYLI, this toolkit provides a professionally designed public communication toolkit available for members and partners to co-brand and use. We are constantly seeking input for additional campaign ideas. In 2018, we created fact sheets on topics of drought and Tap vs. bottled water. This year we performed our #Hike4Water social media contest in partnership with Water Education Colorado.

Quarterly Newsletter

This year we published three information packed newsletters to keep members informed about current water conservation best management practices, case studies, programs and events. One of the notable topics explored in 2018 explored how invasive species disrupt our natural environment and what communities are doing to further conservation.
