# SURVIVING AND THRIVING

It was a really hard year in America. We suffered through the pandemic, economic collapse, school closings, massive wildfires and political upheaval. Let's take some space to thank the heroes: the health care workers, fire fighters, and front-line workers who helped us while exposing themselves to great risk. We don't know where we'd be without you.

Many nonprofit organizations have suffered, and here at CWW we were concerned about declining membership and non-member participation. Instead, we are thrilled to report that our water conservation community banded together and thrived. With the help of our dedicated board of directors, talented staff and our passionate members, we did what we do best: enacted creative solutions for a big problem.

Normally we pull together during a drought to reduce water use. This time, our community came together to help programs thrive in the face of limited staff, limited budgets and huge helpings of uncertainty and risk. We utilized our collective creative skills and flexibility. CWW moved entirely online. We launched a new website, held webinars and pivoted to a remote, low-cost Symposium that achieved high attendance. Our Live Like You Love It steering committee provided new educational materials and began work on a promotional video. We launched a statewide water conservation study that received data from 94 Colorado utilities (report available in 2021).

This past autumn, unseasonably high temperatures and low precipitation raised our eyebrows. Observation turned into concern as winter failed to bring significant precipitation, and now we're in regional discussions on storage and drought messaging. We hope the stronger relationships forged during the pandemic will strengthen the cooperation of communities in spreading drought education to all Coloradans.

- Advancing Water Efficient Landscape Ordinances: What's been done and where do we go next?






# 2020 PROGRAMS DATA AND TOOLS



Colorado gains all their operating funds through annual membership and the Annual Symposium event. As a small non-profit, we are able to keep expenses low allowing us to do even more with our member driven income.

In 2020, Colorado WaterWise transferred our savings account to Clean Energy Credit Union. This account transfer allowed Colorado WaterWise to align our reserve funds and overall finances even closer with our Core Principles. Clean Energy Credit Union is able to use these deposits to extend low-interest lines of credit to those interested in borrowing to make clean energy upgrades including solar, building envelope upgrades, and even purchasing electric vehicles and bikes
